


Truagh and Aughnacloy (Blackwater Region)




Strategic Location:

- Very high levels of emigration
- Poor roads, services and limited public transport
- Stagnant economy, no tourism, lack of business connections across the border
- Separate communities on both sides and across the divide with extreme local loyalties




